### **Mayborn Museum Complex**

#### 1300 S. University Parks Drive

Natural history and traveling exhibits dominate downstairs, with a hands-on discovery center and 17 themed rooms upstairs. Don't miss the 13-acre historic American West village out back!



# **Oakwood and First Street cemeteries**

2124 S. 5th Street / 106 Texas Ranger Trail Oakwood is the final resting place for more than 36,000 people, from Texas Governors, University Presidents, inventors, educators, athletes and veterans. The First Street Cemetery, Waco's first public cemetery, is home to confederate soldiers and Texas Rangers, among others.



#### **Doris Miller Memorial**

#### 300 N. Martin Luther King Jr. Blvd.

This beautiful monument memorializes hometown hero Doris Miller, who during the attack on Pear Harbor, pulled his captain to safety and manned anti-aircraft guns without training.





## **Alico Building**

## 425 Austin Ave. Drive by only

Having weathered one of the deadliest F5 tornadoes in U.S. history (1953), it is a miracle the ALICO still exists; the storm destroyed virtually every other downtown structure. Today, the ALICO stands as a symbol of strength for the greater Waco community. Professional offices are housed inside.

# **Waco Suspension Bridge**

#### 101 N. University Parks Drive

Before 1869, crossing the Brazos River was a time-consuming and dangerous ordeal; the only way to cross was by ferry. Waco's location along the Chisholm Trail necessitated a safe place for cattlemen to cross on their way up to Kansas City. Tolls cost 5 cents per head of cattle, and pedestrians were charged, too.



#### **Cameron Park**

#### 2601 N. University Parks Drive

A 416-acre oasis in the middle of the city, the park was donated by the William Cameron family more than 100 years ago. Hikers, bikers, anglers, disc golfers and others keep this natural area abuzz with activity. Lover's Leap provides a photo-worthy view, the highest natural point in the city.




## Katy Ballpark

# The Earle-Harrison House and Pape Gardens

## 1901 N. 5th Street

Prized for its botanical garden and grounds as much for the antebellum house itself, visitors to this Greek-Revival mansion are wowed by towering oaks, a lily pond, and a huge rose arbor. The **Earle-Napier-Kinnard Hous**e and the **McCulloch House** are other historic homes of interest.



# **Hippodrome Theater**

#### 724 Austin Ave.

For more than a century, the Hippodrome has served as a downtown hub for entertainment. At the 1914 grand opening, Wacoans paid 10 cents a ticket to view a live seal act, a magic show, and a five-piece orchestra.
